Anticipation/Reaction Guide - Reading Educator

Follow these steps to create an Anticipation/Reaction Guide: Identify major concepts or " big ideas " you want students to learn from the text. Create four to six statements that support or challenge students ' beliefs about the topic. Share the guide with students and ask them to Agree or Disagree ...

Anticipation/Reaction Guide - ALL-ED

The Anticipation-Reaction Guide template provides an organizational structure that guides students as they read and analyze the text passage. Teachers can use this guide to: Activate students ' background knowledge before reading; Help them identify textual evidence during reading; Help them to evaluate their own and one or more author ' s perspectives after reading; To prepare the guide, the teacher reviews the curricular materials and identifies key concepts or themes.

The reaction portion of an anticipation-reaction guide activity requires students to come to final conclusions about what the text actually states as the answer to the questions provided on the anticipation-reaction guide. Students get to ask themselves questions such as, "Did I guess right?" "Was my initial guess confirmed?"

Anticipation/Reaction Guide Research: An anticipation guide is meant to be used before reading in order to activate student 's background knowledge on a topic and also to create excitement about a new topic.

Anticipation/Reaction Guides encourage students to interact with the author while thinking about issues and ideas. Teachers may use an Anticipation/Reaction Guide to assess class knowledge before they begin a thematic unit or lesson. To develop student analytic reading skills.

An Anticipation Guide is a strategy that is used before reading to activate students' prior knowledge and build curiosity about a new topic. Before reading a selection, students respond to several statements that challenge or support their preconceived ideas about key concepts in the text.

Definition/Description: An anticipation guide is used before reading to activate students' prior knowledge and get students excited and curious about a new topic. Before reading, students listen to the teacher or another student state key ideas about the concepts in the text.
